

2010 NRHA Non Pro and Youth World Champions

REINING'S GLOBAL APPEAL IS evident whenever you look at NRHA's world champions and Top 10 standings. From Canada to Texas, the Carolinas to California, and Germany to Japan, Reining is on top of the world and at the forefront of the western performance-horse universe.

To earn a berth on the Top 10 year-end standings and win an NRHA world championship, exhibitors (humans and horses) must have earned money in at least seven NRHA-approved shows in the respective division. Earnings and youth points are calculated within the NRHA awards year, which begins with the first approved show after the NRHA Futurity and ends with the following year's NRHA Futurity.

The horse's earnings, no matter how many riders it has had during the year, determine the winners in the open, intermediate open, limited open, novice horse open level 1 and 2, and rookie professional divisions. Earnings are calculated on a one-horse, one-rider combination in the non pro, intermediate non pro, limited non pro, novice horse non pro level 1 and 2, Prime Time non pro, and the youth divisions.

NRHA awards Lawson trophies and Bob's saddles to the world champions and Morrison bronzes to the reserve world champions. The world and reserve world champions also receive Montana Silversmiths' buckles. The Top 10 from third place down receive a pewter trophy.

The world champions, reserve world champions and Top 10 listed on the following pages, as well as a host of other NRHA honorees, will be formally recognized during the NRHA Awards Banquet on June 30, held during the NRHA Derby, June 27 through July 2, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
