The Chautauqua Sports Hall of Fame is planning for its second annual golf tournament, Saturday, June 15, 2019, on the Lake Course at The Chautauqua Golf Club. The tourney is open to inductees, members and friends of the CSHOF. Stan Marshaus, a 2006 inductee, along with Sam Restivo a 2017 inductee, are chairmen of the event.

The event will be a 1:00 shotgun-start scramble. Men's, ladies' and mixed teams are welcomed. Only thirty-one (31) foursomes will be registered. Each player will receive a sleeve of balls.

There will be a pre-match lunch at noon; food, snacks and drinks on the course; and a post-match dinner. The

fee is \$300 per team. Price includes carts and all amenities listed above.

Teams will be divided into four flights after all scores are submitted. Each flight winning team will receive CSHOF golf shirts.

Major League Baseball - 67 Years Ago

Baseball fans of today know that there are 30 major league teams in 27 cities from coast to coast and even into Canada. New York City, Chicago and Los Angeles have two teams each and Toronto is the Canadian entry.



Compare that to MLB of 1952 when there were only 16 teams playing in 10 cities, none farther west than St. Louis, nor any farther south than Washington, D.C. There were 3 teams in New York City and 2 each in Boston, Chicago, St. Louis and Philadelphia.



The Chautauqua Sports Hall of Fame has inducted 10 professional baseball players who were in the major leagues in 1952 or earlier: **Hugh Bedient**, 1912-1914; **Walt Brown**, 1947; **Ray Caldwell**, 1910-1921; **Howard Ehmke**, 1916-1930; **Swat Erickson**, 1914-1922; **Nellie Fox**, 1947-1965; **Jack Harper**, 1899-1906; **Tommy Leach**, 1898-1915, 1918; **Irv Noren**, 1950-1960; and **Johnny O'Neil**, 1946

So for which of the 16 major league teams of those times did the CSHOF inductees play?

New York Yankees Caldwell (1910-1918) and Noren (1952-1956)

New York Giants Erickson (1914)

Brooklyn Dodgers No one, although Noren played for the relocated LA Dodgers in 1960

Boston Red Sox Bedient (1912-1914), Caldwell (1919) and Ehmke(1923-1926)

Boston Braves No one

Chicago Cubs Harper (1906), Leach (1912-1914) and Noren (1959-1960)

Chicago White Sox Fox (1950-1963)

St. Louis Browns Brown (1947) and Harper (1902)

St. Louis Cardinals Harper (1900-1901) and Noren (1957-1959)
Philadelphia Athletics Ehmke (1926-1930) and Fox (1947-1949)

Philadelphia Phillies O'Neil (1946)

Cleveland Indians Caldwell (1919-1921) and Harper (1899)

Pittsburgh Pirates Leach (1900-1912, 1918)

Washington Senators Erickson (1919-1922) and Noren (1950-1952)

Cincinnati Reds Harper (1903-1906) and Leach (1915)

Detroit Tigers Ehmke(1916-1922) and Erickson (1916, 1918-1919)

One other CSHOF inductee, **Dave Criscione**, played major league baseball for the Baltimore Orioles in 1977. Before the Orioles moved to Baltimore in 1954, they were the St. Louis Browns.



After World War II, there were 366 minor league teams playing in 52 leagues from Maine to California and from Cuba to Alberta, Canada. There were 42 teams in North Carolina alone! Nearly 10,000 players were under contract from Class D through Class AAA. It makes one wonder if CSHOF inductee, **Dan Lunetta**, the Director of Minor League Operations for the Detroit Tigers, would have liked to have been in charge during that era!
